Furthermore, let us not disobey the Word of God by failing to pray for salvation, understanding, and wisdom for all earthly powers and authorities, love them or hate them (1 Timothy 2:1-4). The center verse of the Bible, however, must be central to our thinking, if we are to view things in proper perspective. “It is better to trust in the LORD Than to put confidence in man” (Psalm 118:8). “But seek first the kingdom of God” (Matthew 6:33). When we enjoy close communion with the Almighty, everything else pales in comparison. Isaiah the prophet had a vision of the glory of God, a glimpse into His heavenly throne room. In recounting this monumental event of his time of earth, Isaiah begins his narrative by saying, “In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne” (Isaiah 6:1).

Little Lies

A little white lie. A half-truth. A lie by omission. We are all guilty of it. We do it so we don’t hurt someone’s feelings or so we aren’t made to feel uncomfortable in any way. They seem harmless. But are they really? The Bible is clear that lying displeases God. It’s a sin. Telling a lie/being dishonest, referred to also as “bearing false witness”, was the ninth commandment that was handed down on stone tablets to Moses on Mount Sinai (Exodus 20).

In Chapter 3 of Genesis, we read that the serpent told Eve that she wouldn’t die if she ate fruit from the forbidden tree. We read this even before Eve gave into the serpent’s deception and the temptation that caused her to eat the forbidden fruit. But a lie is a minor sin, right? It certainly can’t be as bad as murdering someone. Let’s take a look at what the Bible says about these things.

Proverbs 6:16-19, “These six things the Lord hates, Yes, seven are an abomination to Him:

17 A proud look, A lying tongue, Hands that shed innocent blood,
18 A heart that devises wicked plans, Feet that are swift in running to evil,
19 A false witness who speaks lies, And one who sows discord among brethren.”

It sounds like the Lord looks at all of those sins equally, all seven are an abomination to Him. Read on, specifically he calls lying lips an abomination and refers to truth as a delight.

Proverbs 12:22, “Lying lips are an abomination to the Lord, but those who deal truthfully are His delight.”

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The Fatal Mistake of the Casually Religious By Joe McKeever

One of a thousand reasons the Psalms are so well-loved is that once in a while, we will be reading along and come to a place where that psalm nails a truth so dead-on, we sit there gasping for breath. Case in point, Psalm 50.

“You hate instruction and cast my words behind you. When you saw a thief, you consented with him, and have been a partaker with adulterers. You give your mouth to evil, and your tongue frames deceit. You sit and speak against your brother; you slander your own mother’s son.”

And then, the clincher:

“These things you have done, and I kept silent; you thought that I was just like you” (Ps. 50:17-21).

Thinking that the Eternal God is like us is an ancient tradition with a noble heritage. Every culture has done it, every generation has adapted the art to its own idiosyncracies, every worshiper struggles with the temptation to pull it off.

It’s been said, “In the beginning, God made man in His image. Ever since, man has been returning the favor.”

A couple of decades ago country music legend Johnny Cash paid to have a Hollywood movie made on the life of Christ. In the film, Jesus was depicted as a blue-eyed blonde. I’ve been to the Middle East and the only blue-eyed blondes I spotted were in our tour group. Everyone else, all the natives, seemed to be of a sun-dried dark color with jet black hair.

As prevalent as that is—the way we picture Jesus as looking like someone who would easily blend in with our group—a far worse thing it is to think of God as carrying our own prejudices, hemmed in by our narrow-mindednesses, burdened by our brand of negativities, and limited by our own personal convictions. The Bible’s favorite word to describe God is needed here. He is holy.

The word “holy,” scholars tell us, means “other than.” God is something else, in the vernacular. He is above us and outside our limitations, far more than we can ever imagine. “As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, and My thoughts than your thoughts” (Isaiah 55:9).

Proverbs 26:28, "A lying tongue hates those who are crushed by it, and a flattering mouth works ruin."

Ephesians 4:25, "Therefore, putting away lying, "Let each one of you speak truth with his neighbor," for we are members of one another."

1 Corinthians 13:4-6, "4 Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy; love does not parade itself, is not puffed up; 5 does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; 6 does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth"

Let's read that again, lies are an abomination to the Lord? Yes! Love rejoices in the truth? Yes! It doesn't say that we should hide the truth to save feelings of yourself or another? Nope! I think I even read in the Ephesians verse noted above that if we lie to another, we also lie to ourselves since we are members of one another... we are all brothers and sisters of the Lord, our God, our Creator, and our Savior.

I'll close with this, a verse from Psalm 120:2, "Deliver my soul, O LORD, from lying lips and from a deceitful tongue." Amen.

“YE MUST BE BORN AGAIN”, John Chapter 3, By Rick Meunier

The following message contains what I feel to be one of the most important (if not the most important) doctrine in the Bible. It talks of sinful man’s most important need; A new birth that can only be given by God, and by which no man can enter heaven, unless he has been “born again.” The text is John Chapter 3, along with many other scriptural references to support the teaching. Please use your Bible to follow the points, and to research all the Bible references given. May the Holy Spirit bless you, and guide you into all truth, as He illuminates His Word in your heart.

“YE MUST BE BORN AGAIN”

1. Nicodemus, an educated ruler of the Jews, had an appointment with Jesus. John 3:1-2. He also had somewhat of an idea who Jesus was. John 3:2, Acts 10:38.
2. Jesus wasted no time with small talk, because He knew what Nicodemus’ need was. John 3:3. This educated religious leader of Israel had a need?
3. Nicodemus needed a new birth, and at first he didn’t understand, so Jesus explained further. John 3:4-7. Nicodemus needed a new birth, or a regeneration from God. The necessity of this new birth grows out of the incapacity of the natural man to “enter into” the Kingdom of God. No matter how gifted, moral, or educated the natural man is, he is blind to spiritual truth, and can neither obey, understand, or please God. Psalm 51:5, Jeremiah 17:9, Mark 7:21-23; 1 Corinthians 2:14, Romans 8:7, Ephesians 2:3.
4. The new birth is not a reformation of the old nature, Romans 6:6, but rather, it is a creative act of the Holy Spirit. John 3:5, Titus 3:5, 2 Corinthians 5:17.
5. The condition of the new birth is faith in Christ crucified. John 1:12-13, 3:14, Numbers 21:5-9.
6. Through the new birth, the believer becomes a partaker of the divine nature, and of the life of Christ Himself. Galatians 2:20, Ephesians 2:10, 4:24, 1 Peter 1:23-25, 2 Peter 1:4.

Have you been born again? Do you have the new birth?

Is your name written in the Lamb’s Book of Life?

We have been made in the image of God. But we are not like God. Not much. To our everlasting shame. Let's talk about this. It's worth noting that the Psalm 50 passage we quoted is addressed to one group: "to the wicked."

Let's not make the mistake of thinking this is directed toward Gentiles, Moabites, Ammonites, and other assorted pagans. This is talking about God's own people, many of whom are being called down for their wicked behavior. In fact, earlier (vs. 5), they are referred to as: "my saints" and "those who have made a covenant with me by sacrifice."

Then, as now, the Lord expects better things out of His own children. The standards are higher for them because they have been given so much.

The Lord takes His people to task for several affronts—in our text, He mentions a disregard for God's word, thievery, adultery, evil-speaking, and mistreatment of brothers—as well as their tendency to try to placate Him with offerings when their sins are so obvious and not being dealt with.

Norman Vincent Peale used to tell of the time when he was 10 years old and had found half a cigar which he proceeded to smoke. Just at that moment, he spotted his father coming down the sidewalk toward him. There was nothing to do but to hide the smoking material behind him and try to divert the father so he would not notice.

"Father," young Vincent called out, "there's a circus in town! Could you please take us? Please?" The senior Peale said calmly, "Norman, never make a plea for grace when you are hiding a smoldering disobedience behind your back."

We love the way the Lord dismissed their attempts to bribe Him with generous offerings: "If I were hungry, I would not tell you; For the world is mine, and all its fullness." (Ps. 50:12).

The sin of the casually religious—and that's what these people were—is to take God's silence as something other than what it was.

God meant His silence as time for them to repent; they saw it as approval of their behavior.

God meant His patience as a evidence of His love; they saw it as a weakness of His standards.

God meant His grace as a merciful favor to undeserving sinners; they saw it as evidence of God's laxity and proof of their goodness.

This week I listened to the televised broadcast of a former long-time senator who died recently. What struck me was how easily religious words were applied to this politician who, it appeared to me, did not deserve them. A priest called him "a man of God," but not for his piety or relationship with the Almighty, but more for other lesser traits.

The obituaries in our local newspaper will print whatever the family or friends will pay for, it appears. That's why almost every person who dies in this city "was received into heaven on Thursday night by a legion of angels," or other such flowery prose. No one around here lives a godless life and dies without the Lord, we judge by the obits.

I am not advocating publishing death-notices in which we send people to perdition, in case anyone wonders.

I'd just like a little more truth-telling in these things. If the guy had no use for God, then leave the Almighty out of the obituary and his memorial service. If he never went to church, then don't have his funeral there but instead consider asking the local justice of the peace to hold the service in a local American Legion hall.

If we're not going to believe, the least we could do is have the strength of our lack of convictions and be consistent.

Mark Buchanan's book "Your God is Too Safe" took up the issue of the one-dimensional way we look at God a few years back in a fascinating way. Right now, a friend and I are working our way through the book, the second time for me. (Buy it used at www.alibris.com for a pittance; it could be the best investment you make this year.)

One reason we who call ourselves disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ are continually urged to develop personal habits of daily, consecutive Bible reading is to hear all that God says to us in His word and not just the parts we are already familiar with.

But as He who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct, because it is written, "Be holy, for I am holy" (I Peter 1:15-16).

The Book of Life, By James Moriello

This study has been prepared to explain the biblical teaching of the “Book of Life”. To this end, we will look at twelve Scriptures that speak of it. The understanding that best harmonizes all of the biblical texts on the subject is that there are actually two books written in heaven. In addition, there are multiple books in heaven which contain the works of those who trusted in them. The “Book of Life”, or the ‘Book of all Living’ contains the names of all people ever created. The “Lamb’s Book of Life”, or the ‘Book of all Saved’, contains the names of only those redeemed sinners who have trusted Jesus Christ for eternal salvation and have an eternal home in heaven. These are literal books. One of the rules of biblical interpretation is to take Scripture in its literal sense unless the context clearly indicates otherwise. The context of the selected verse determines which book is being referenced. Most Scriptures are followed by my brief commentary.

Exodus 32:32-33: 32 Yet now, if You will forgive their sin—but if not, I pray, blot me out of Your book which You have written.” 33 And the LORD said to Moses, “Whoever has sinned against Me, I will blot him out of My book.

Commentary: This is the first book, the Book of Life. It cannot be the Lamb’s Book of Life because nobody can be blotted out of that book, since salvation is eternally secure and cannot be lost (John 3:16, 10:28). Sin is the cause of the blotting out. Believers are free from the power of sin positionally, but sin remains as a curse upon unbelievers (Psalm 32:1-2; John 9:41). Ultimately, when all unbelievers are blotted out of the ‘Book of all Living’, the two books will match, and there will be two copies of the heavenly citizens roll.

Psalm 69:27-28: 27 Add iniquity to their iniquity, And let them not come into Your righteousness. 28 Let them be blotted out of the book of the living, And not be written with the righteous.

Psalm 139:16: 16 Your eyes saw my substance, being yet unformed. And in Your book they all were written, The days fashioned for me, When as yet there were none of them.

Commentary: This passage supports the idea of the existence of a book containing the names of all people, their days beginning at conception. Of those, many were chosen from “before the foundation of the world” (Ephesians 1:4).

Daniel 12:1: “At that time Michael shall stand up, The great prince who stands watch over the sons of your people; And there shall be a time of trouble, Such as never was since there was a nation, Even to that time. And at that time your people shall be delivered, Every one who is found written in the book.”

Commentary: This cannot be the book containing the names of all living, since not all are saved. The reference is to the Lamb’s Book of Life.

Luke 10:20: 20 Nevertheless do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven.

Commentary: The unsaved dead will not be rejoicing in heaven. The reference is to the Lamb’s Book of Life. What a great encouragement to believers these words are!

Philippians 4:3: 3 And I urge you also, true companion, help these women who labored with me in the gospel, with Clement also, and the rest of my fellow workers, whose names are in the Book of Life.

Revelation 3:5: 5 He who overcomes shall be clothed in white garments, and I will not blot out his name from the Book of Life; but I will confess his name before My Father and before His angels.

Commentary: This is the opposite scenario as we had in Exodus 32:32-33 (see commentary above on that verse). There is no blotting out names from the Lamb’s Book of Life.

Revelation 13:8: 8 All who dwell on the earth will worship him, whose names have not been written in the Book of Life of the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world.

Commentary: This is the fulfillment of Philippians 2:9-11.

Revelation 17:8: 8 The beast that you saw was, and is not, and will ascend out of the bottomless pit and go to perdition. And those who dwell on the earth will marvel, whose names are not written in the Book of Life from the foundation of the world, when they see the beast that was, and is not, and yet is.

Commentary: In light of Psalm 139:16 (see commentary on that verse), the reference here is to the Lamb's Book of Life.

Revelation 20:11-15: 11 Then I saw a great white throne and Him who sat on it, from whose face the earth and the heaven fled away. And there was found no place for them. 12 And I saw the dead, small and great, standing before God, and books were opened. And another book was opened, which is the Book of Life. And the dead were judged according to their works, by the things which were written in the books. 13 The sea gave up the dead who were in it, and Death and Hades delivered up the dead who were in them. And they were judged, each one according to his works. 14 Then Death and Hades were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death. 15 And anyone not found written in the Book of Life was cast into the lake of fire.

Commentary: This is the Great White Throne Judgment. Only unbelievers experience this judgment. Those who trust their own works instead of Christ for their eternal hope are judged on the basis of the works and fall short of heaven (Romans 3:10-23; Ephesians 2:8-10). One sin is enough to disqualify them, but there are many more than one written of each of them in the additional volumes (James 2:10). In verse 15, the reference is clearly to the Lamb's Book of Life.

Revelation 21:27: 27 But there shall by no means enter it anything that defiles, or causes an abomination or a lie, but only those who are written in the Lamb's Book of Life.

Commentary: This refers to entrance into the Celestial City in the very presence of God.

Revelation 22:19: 19 and if anyone takes away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part from the Book of Life, from the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book.

Uzziah lived a long time, and he was a relatively good human king in his days, but he was not the one in which Isaiah trusted. King Uzziah died like every other man. Note the contrast. God was not dead! He was alive and well on His glorious throne, just as He always was. Just as He is today, and ever shall be. So instead of being preoccupied with the world, let all Christians everywhere be preoccupied with the Savior, and with heavenly things, even as we are occupied with day to day life. Let the children of God pray after the manner of King David. "In You, O LORD, I put my trust; Let me never be put to shame. Deliver me in Your righteousness, and cause me to escape; Incline your ear to me, and save me. Be my strong refuge, To which I may resort continually; You have given the commandment to save me, For You are my rock and my fortress" (Psalm 71:1-3).

"To everything there is a season, A time for every purpose under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1). Another spring has come upon us, and that makes me think of spring cleaning.
