## 'Saint Patrick's Day', (Acts 1:8)

"But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (Acts 1:8, NKJV)

The way that folks celebrate this day today, one would think that Saint Patrick was a heathen lush from the lush country of Ireland. That could not be further from the truth. Saint Patrick was born in the late fourth century, and according to tradition, he died on March 17<sup>th</sup>, on or about the year 461 A.D..
